Monologue 1

Charlie and the Chocolate Factory is a children's novel by British author Roald Dahl. The story features the adventures of a young boy named Charlie Bucket inside the chocolate factory of a strange chocolate maker named Willy Wonka.

Charlie and the Chocolate Factory was first published in the United States in 1964. The book has been adapted into two major movies. The first was Willy Wonka & the Chocolate Factory in 1971. The second was Charlie and the Chocolate Factory which was released in 2005. This version was directed by Tim Burton and starred Johnny Depp as Willy Wonka.

The story was originally inspired by Roald Dahl's experience of chocolate companies during his schooldays. The Cadbury chocolate company would often send test packages of chocolate to the schoolchildren in exchange for their opinions on the new products. At that time, Cadbury and Rowntree's were England's two largest chocolate makers. They often tried to steal trade secrets by sending spies into the other's factories. Because of this, both companies became highly protective of their way of making chocolate. It was a combination of this and the gigantic machines in the factories that inspired Roald Dahl to write the story. So far the book has sold more than 20 million copies in 55 languages.
