Course Description

This course will provide an overview of language assessment concepts, techniques, and tools to facilitate valid and reliable assessment in the classroom. The course will also provide students with knowledge to evaluate and critique language tests, which include high-stakes tests (e.g., TOEIC). We will discuss how classroom assessment is (or should be) different from high-stakes tests. Students will have an opportunity to apply their knowledge and skills in class. Students will also develop familiarity with research articles on language assessment. The course will be student-centered. Thus, active participation is expected and highly encouraged.
